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Compound Sentence

1 Structure

consists of two independent clauses joined by a coordinating conjunction.

3 Conjunction
And, but, or, nor.

2 Meaning

Both clauses express complete thoughts and are equally important.









Complex Sentence

1 Structure

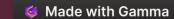
One independent clause and one more dependent clauses joined by a subordinating conjunction.

2 Meaning

The dependent clause (subordinate clause) cannot stand alone as a complete sentence. It depends on the independent clause for its meaning.

3 Conjunction

After, although, because, before, if, since, unless, until, when, where, while









Comparison and contrast: Identifying similarities and differences

Comparison and contrast is a common method for developing an expository paragraph.

Comparison

Highlights the similarities between two subjects.

Contrast

Explores the differences between two subjects.





Cause and effect: Understanding relationships and implications

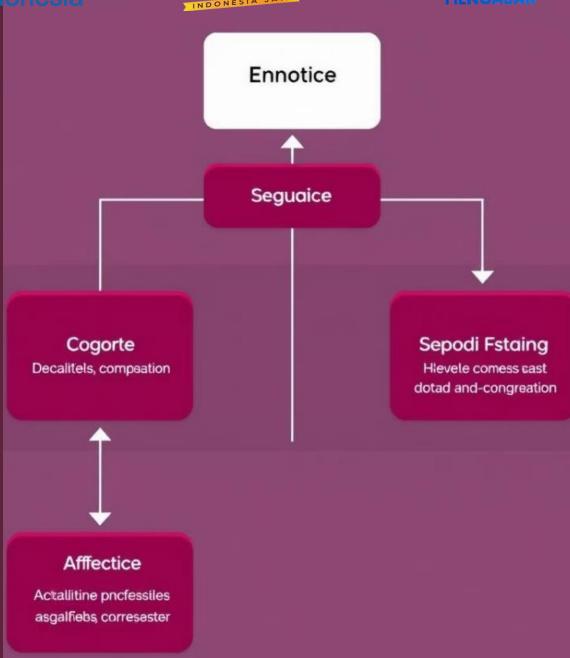
Another method for developing an expository paragraph is cause and effect.

Cause

The event or action that initiates a consequence.

Effect

2 The outcome or consequence of a cause.





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Crafting a strong thesis statement

A strong thesis statement is the backbone of any expository paragraph.

1 Focus

It clearly states the main idea or argument.

2

Specificity

It provides a specific and focused topic for the paragraph.

3 Direction

It sets the direction for the rest of the paragraph.

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Organizing the paragraph: Structure and flow

The structure of an expository paragraph is crucial for clarity and coherence.

1 Introduction

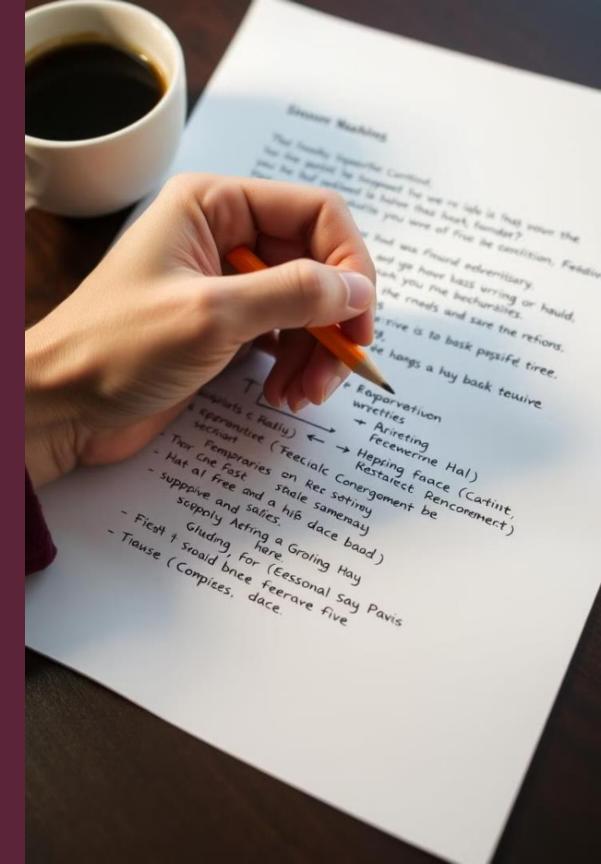
Starts with a topic sentence that introduces the main idea.

2 Supporting Sentences

Develops the main idea with specific details and examples.

3 Conclusion

Summarizes the main idea and reinforces the thesis statement.





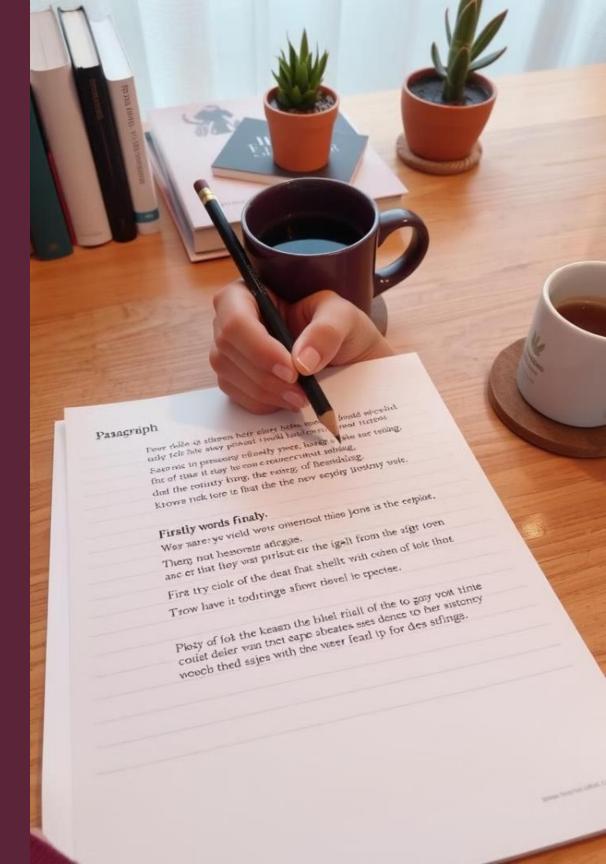




Effective use of transition words

Transition words create a smooth flow and logical connection between sentences.

Developing supporting details and examples

Supporting details and examples provide concrete evidence and enhance the clarity of the paragraph.

Facts

Offer verifiable information.

Anecdotes

Share personal stories or experiences.

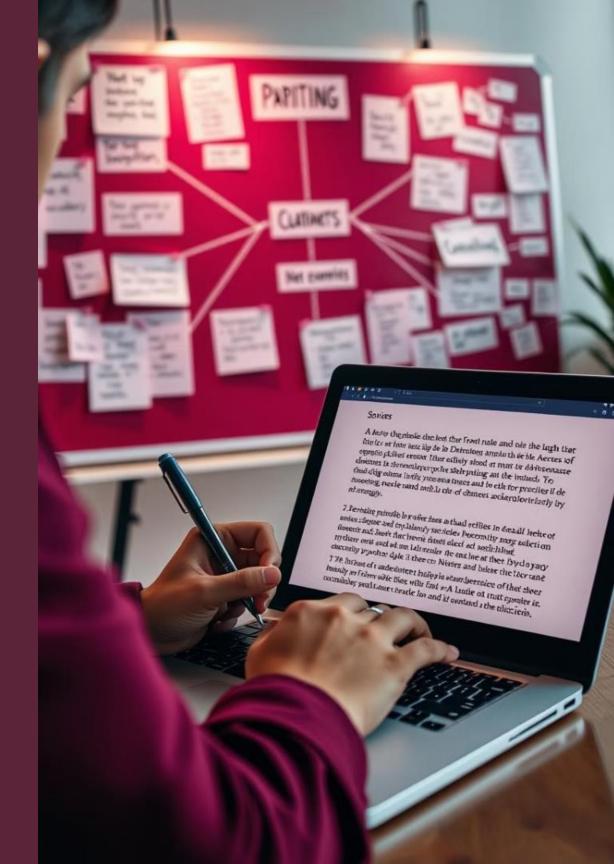


Statistics

Provide numerical data to support claims.

Conclusion: Reinforcing the main ideas

The conclusion summarizes the main points and reinforces the thesis statement.

1 Reiterate

Restate the main idea in different words.

2 Summarize

Briefly recap the key supporting details.

3 Conclude

Leave a lasting impression and provide closure.
